

Who created the mask worn by Michael Myers in the movie Halloween and was later involved in copyright litigation related to that mask in the Eastern District of Pennsylvania?



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
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Type Halloween mask in the search field.

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The endorsement of religion in public schools often arises as a point of controversy. While some would consider that Halloween is far from being a religious celebration, this presumption has been challenged in several cases.

Find a legal encyclopedia entry which provides details into a case in which the court held that the depiction of Halloween images (e.g., witches and brooms) does not violate the Establishment Cause by endorsing or promoting religion. Provide citations for the encyclopedia article AND the case cited.
